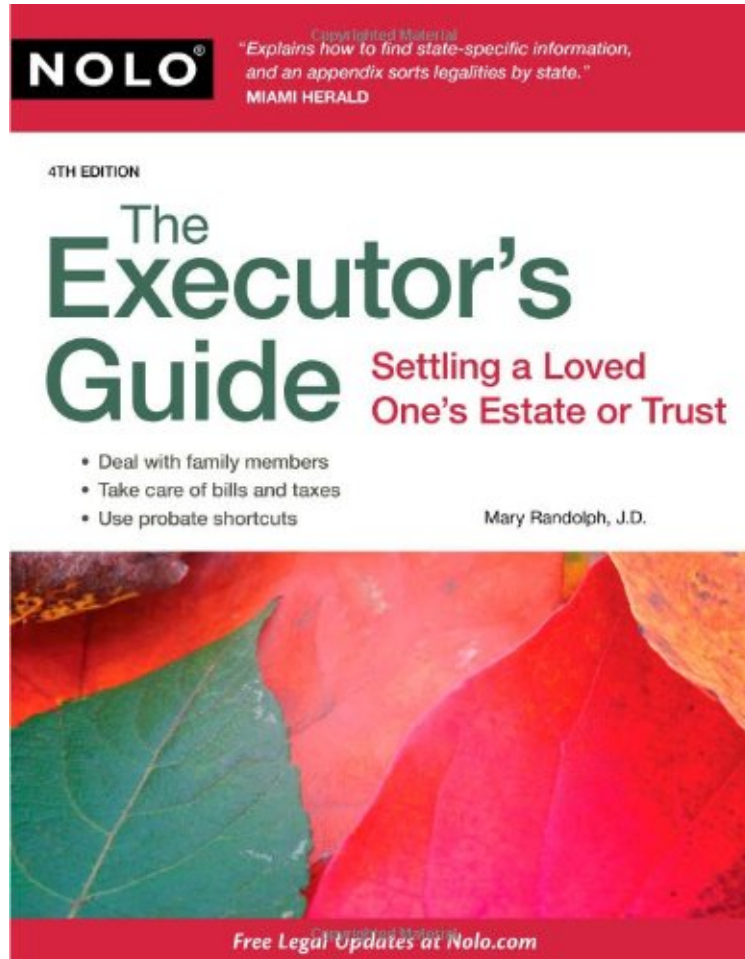

It covers ordinary probate and the most common variations. These matters vary state-by-state of course, but if you don't have the good fortune (in a manner of speaking) to live in California or New York, you won't find many monographs written on probate etc in your own state. The author does a very good job of covering the general (Uniform Probate Code the most common customs in the several States), and she makes well-selected references as well to salient and significant oddities in particular states, with tables etc that make this sort of thing easier to grasp.I recommend Hughes' and Klein's "Executor's Handbook" as well, and in fact it might be a bit easier to

read that one first. But both are of great help and in difficult matters such as probate (for laypersons, anyway, who are the readers intended for the books) it's best to get the perspective offered by at least two sources; you'll unlikely want to pay two lawyers (and unless it's a very simple estate, with no possibility of being contested, you'll want a lawyer), so avail yourself of these books. 6 of 6 people found the following review helpful.
