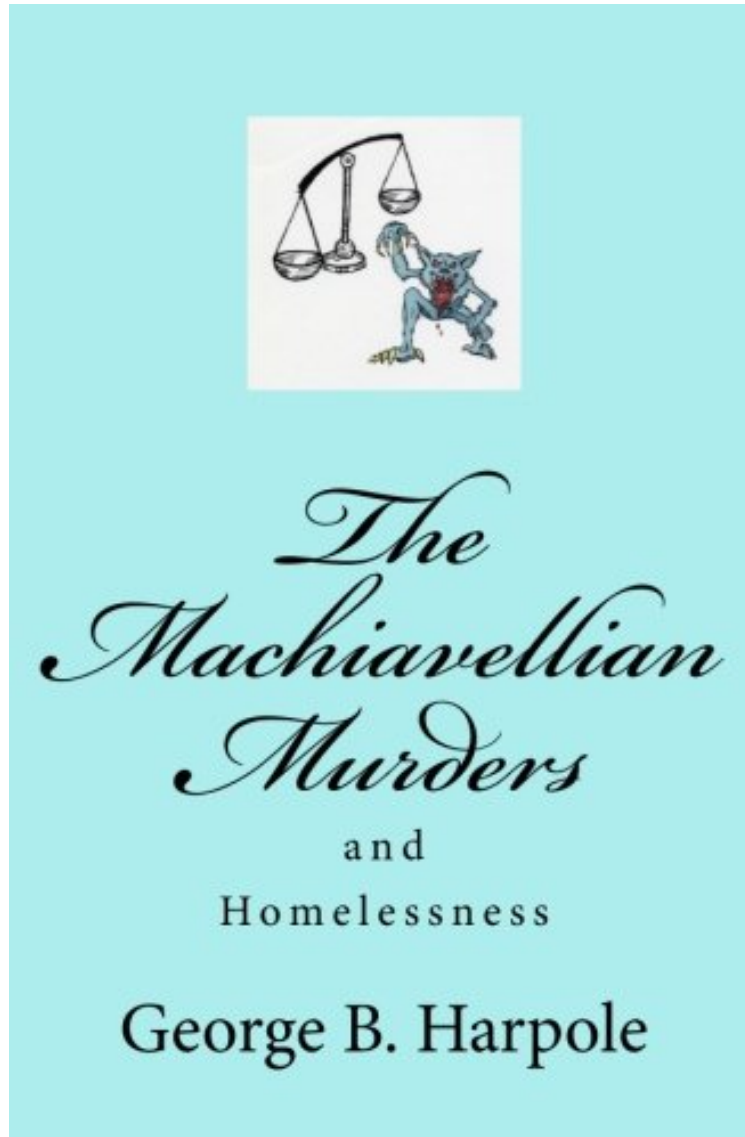

Droskin The Machiavellian Murders is an autobiographical work written by retired Forest Products Laboratory worker George Harpole. George describes how his storybook years with loving wife Marta and their two children took a horrific turn when Marta took her own life. A haunting depression, mixed with experimental antipsychotic medications were to blame for ripping this wife and mother from the family she loved. Despite the tragedy, Harpole gives an honoring account of Marta's life prior to suicide. The story continues as the author attempted to put the pieces back together with a new love and fresh beginning. Despite successful years of marriage to his second wife, troubles gradually developed and differences were irreconcilable. What should have unfolded as a simple divorce, turned into a complicated nightmare in Wisconsin courts nearly reducing George's life to rubble. Harpole attempts to shed light on the racket he experienced involving divorce attorneys, and even judges of Madison Wisconsin. It is revealed that every attempt was made to expand divorce durations yielding maximum profit for all legal professionals involved. Clearly, Harpole is describing corruption in which attorneys in Madison are working to do what's best for themselves more so than what's best for their clients. The author even suggests that there was evidence of attorneys making a sport of working together to drive clients to complete despair and ruin. Harpole describes how Madison attorneys and judges would delight in provocation of a divorce petitioner resulting in violent outbursts repaid with court sanctions. In the sport of petitioner manipulation the ultimate trophy of the Madison divorce attorneys was the suicide of a desperate client.

This booklet presents a collection of what are dime-a-dozen true stories about divorce, separation, homelessness and suicide to support the 7 tabooed suggestions made for family court reform. The heartless money makers don't want these reforms, so the suggestions are ignored. In the meantime, about half of all suicides happen in the shadows of a family court system with victims ranging in age from 8 to 80. The suicides typically die by way of feeling hopelessly separated or homeless. When this happens because of the actions of others their deaths are called Machiavellian murders. To quote Albert Einstein: "The world is a dangerous place to live, not because of those who are evil but because of those who do nothing about it." This booklet does offer 7 things to do about it.
