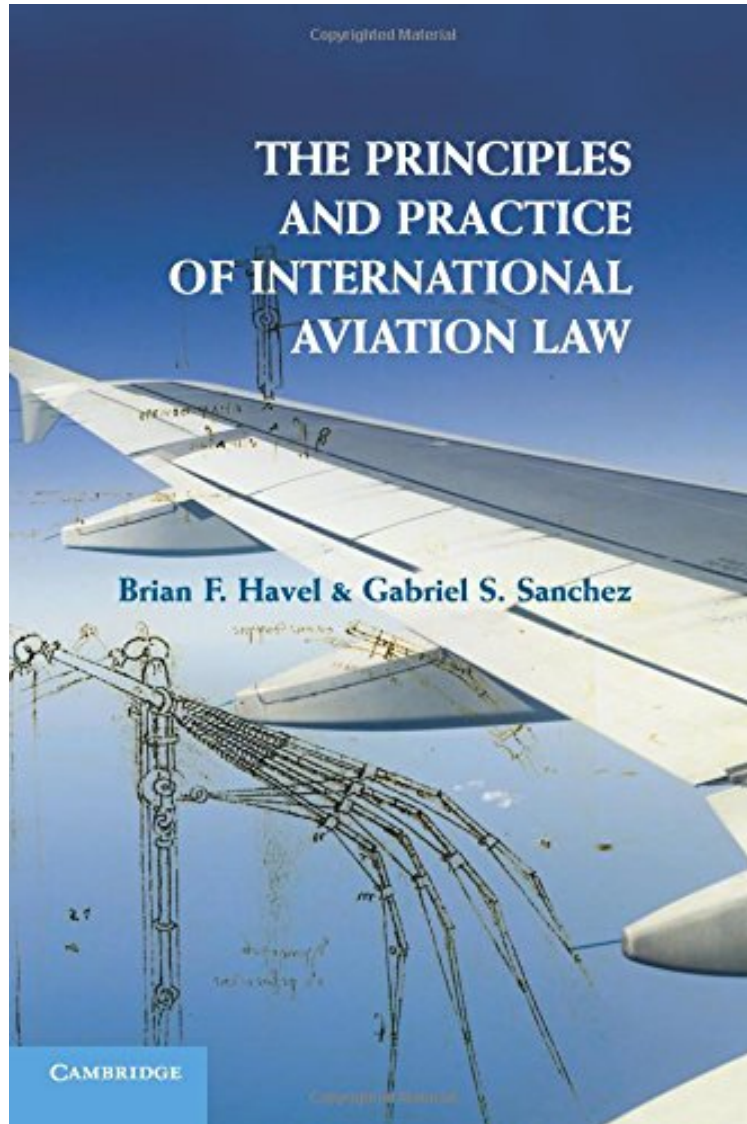

This is the first time this book has been used in the course as they recently changed it from domestic regulations to include global as well. Previously, they used Practical Aviation Law by J. Scott Hamilton as the required textbook. I was excited for this as I enjoy interpreting regs in a practical manner. This book in review, however, is far from practical. As a matter of fact, most of us, including the professor himself agreed that it was downright brutal to read. The Principles and Practice of International Aviation Law provides an introduction to, and demystification of, the private and public dimensions of international aviation law.
